“Study on the Intersection of Megatrends and Child Marriage: Emerging Drivers, Implications and Pathways Forward ”

UNFPA India invites proposals from qualified research agencies, think tanks or consortia to undertake a rigorous study on the intersection between megatrends and child marriage, with a particular focus on identifying megatrends that are functioning as new and emerging drivers of child marriage in India, and on convening expert knowledge to identify implications, good practices and pathways forward.

Terms of Reference (ToR)

1. Background and Rationale

Child marriage remains a pervasive human rights violation, with profound consequences for girls’ education, health, economic empowerment and agency. Despite significant policy commitments and programmatic investments over the past two decades, child marriage persists as a deeply embedded practice in many parts of India, sustained by intersecting structural inequalities rooted in gender, caste, religion, poverty and social norms.

In India, according to the National Family Health Survey-5 (NFHS-5, 2019-21), approximately 23 percent of women aged 20-24 were married before age 18 — a figure that masks significant subnational and socio-economic disparities. In states such as West Bengal, Bihar, Jharkhand, Rajasthan and Tripura, prevalence rates remain alarmingly high, and progress has been uneven.

A new and urgent dimension is emerging: the intersection between large-scale structural shifts — commonly referred to as megatrends — and the drivers of child marriage. Megatrends are macro-level forces of transformation that shape societies, economies and environments over the long term. These include climate change and its cascading impacts, large-scale migration and

displacement, rapid urbanization and the informalization of urban economies, digital transformation, demographic transitions, and evolving conflict and fragility landscapes. While megatrends are not new phenomena, their pace, scale and interaction effects are intensifying in ways that are creating new and compounding risks for girls and adolescents — risks that are inadequately understood and insufficiently integrated into child marriage programming and policy in India.

For instance, extreme weather events linked to climate change — including floods, droughts and cyclones — are eroding household economic resilience, disrupting schooling and increasing displacement. In contexts where child marriage is used as a coping or risk-management strategy, these shocks can accelerate decisions to marry daughters early. Similarly, rural-to-urban migration is reshaping family structures and community-level protective norms, while urbanization creates new but poorly understood vulnerabilities for adolescent girls in informal settlements. The COVID-19 pandemic offered a stark illustration of how crisis conditions can rapidly intensify risk: school closures, economic distress and reduced access to services led to a documented or projected spike in child marriages in several Indian states.

Despite growing evidence of these connections, there remains a significant gap in systematic, contextually grounded analysis of how specific megatrends are operating as new and emerging drivers of child marriage in India. There is similarly limited documentation of what programmatic and policy responses are effectively addressing these emerging risks, or of how civil society, activists and communities are innovating at the intersection of these challenges.

UNFPA India, as the lead UN agency mandated to advance sexual and reproductive health and rights and gender equality, is committed to generating robust evidence on these emerging dynamics and supporting evidence-informed advocacy and programming. In this context, UNFPA India invites proposals from qualified research agencies, think tanks or consortia to undertake a rigorous study on the intersection between megatrends and child marriage, with a particular focus on identifying megatrends that are functioning as new and emerging drivers of child marriage in India, and on convening expert knowledge to identify implications, good practices and pathways forward.

2. Objective

The study has the following primary objectives:

- To identify, analyse and prioritise megatrends that are proving to be new and emerging drivers of child marriage in India, with attention to how these trends operate differently across geographies, socio-economic groups, age cohorts and other axes of vulnerability.
- To examine the pathways and mechanisms through which selected megatrends amplify or create conditions conducive to child marriage, drawing on existing literature, data and evidence.

- To convene a structured multi-stakeholder expert consultation — including civil society organisations, grassroots activists, survivor advocates, researchers and policymakers — to deliberate on the implications of megatrend-driven child marriage risks, share good practices and assess the applicability and scalability of promising models.
- To identify and document good practices, innovative approaches and intervention models that are demonstrably effective or promising in addressing the child marriage risks associated with megatrends.
- To develop a high-quality technical brief or policy paper that synthesises the evidence, expert perspectives, good practices and a forward-looking set of recommendations for policy, programming and advocacy.

3. Scope of work

3.1 Thematic Scope — Megatrends to be Examined

The agency shall examine the following megatrends as potential new and emerging drivers of child marriage, while retaining the flexibility — on the basis of evidence — to prioritise those most significantly and distinctly impacting child marriage in the Indian context:

- **Climate change and environmental shocks** — including extreme weather events (floods, droughts, cyclones and heatwaves), loss of livelihoods dependent on agriculture and natural resources, food and water insecurity, and climate-induced displacement. The analysis shall examine how these phenomena erode household resilience and increase girls' vulnerability to early marriage as a coping mechanism.
- **Migration and displacement** – including patterns of internal migration (rural-to-urban and distress migration), labour migration and climate-induced displacement. The analysis shall examine how migration reshapes family structures, disrupts schooling and social protection systems, and creates new risk environments for adolescent girls, including in transit and destination settings.
- **Rapid urbanization and informalization** – including the growth of informal urban settlements and the informalization of livelihoods in urban and peri-urban areas. The analysis shall examine how urbanization intersects with economic precarity, changes in social norms, reduced community oversight and new forms of gender-based risk for adolescent girls.
- **Digital transformation** – The rapid expansion of digital connectivity, social media and e-commerce, and its complex implications for girls — encompassing both protective dimensions (access to information and social networks) and risk dimensions (online harassment, trafficking and exposure to harmful content).

- **Demographic transitions and youth bulge** – Shifts in age structure, the youth bulge and evolving family and marriage market dynamics, including the intersection of gender-skewed sex ratios and child marriage risk in specific geographies.

3.2 Geographic Scope

The study will be national in scope, with in-depth focus on high-prevalence states identified on the basis of NFHS-5 and other available data. The agency shall propose a sampling framework that ensures coverage of diverse agroecological zones, urban-rural gradients and sociocultural contexts. Selective reference to South Asian or global comparators may be drawn where relevant to the analysis.

4. Methodology

The study shall employ a mixed-methods approach combining rigorous desk review, qualitative research and structured expert consultation. The agency shall develop a detailed methodology in its technical proposal; that include the following elements:

4.1 Comprehensive Desk Review

- Systematic review of peer-reviewed literature, grey literature, programme evaluations and data sources on the intersection of megatrends and child marriage globally and in South Asia.
- Secondary analysis of available quantitative datasets (NFHS-5, Census, Disaster Risk Reduction databases, migration statistics, climate vulnerability indices) to establish the empirical basis for megatrend-child marriage linkages.
- Mapping of existing policy frameworks, programmes and interventions at national and subnational level addressing child marriage in megatrend-affected contexts.

4.2 Validation and data collection

- Key informant interviews with policymakers, programme implementers, researchers and community-level stakeholders in selected states to validate the insights from the secondary research and collect further data and evidence, as required
- Case studies of communities or districts where the intersection of specific megatrends and child marriage risk is particularly acute or well-documented.

4.3 Multi-Stakeholder Expert Consultation

A central requirement of this assignment is the convening of a structured multi-stakeholder day-long expert consultation, involving a diverse range of experts and stakeholders (approximately 20-25), including:

- Civil society organisations working on adolescent empowerment, gender-based violence and harmful practices
- Grassroots activists and community mobilisers, including survivor advocates

- Researchers and academics specialising in child marriage, climate change, migration and development
- Programme practitioners with experience in adolescent empowerment, livelihoods and social protection.
- Government representatives from relevant line ministries and departments
- UN and international agency representatives

The consultation shall be designed to: validate and enrich emerging study findings; elicit expert perspectives on megatrend-specific implications for child marriage programming and policy; facilitate peer learning on good practices and promising models; and generate inputs for the technical brief and policy recommendations. For ease of travel and connectivity, the consultation should be planned in any metropolitan city in India.

The agency shall be responsible for all aspects of consultation design, logistics, facilitation, documentation and reporting. UNFPA India shall advise on and co-design the agenda and shall support participant identification where appropriate

5. Deliverables and Timeline

The following deliverables are expected from the agency:

- **Inception Report** (Comprehensive synthesis of existing literature and secondary data establishing the evidence base for megatrend–child marriage linkages.) – Months 1-3
- **Expert consultation** (Design, convening, facilitation and full documentation of a one- to two-day multi-stakeholder expert consultation, including a consultation report) – Month 4
- **Draft Technical Brief / Policy Paper** (A well-structured, evidence-based technical brief or policy paper (20–30 pages) synthesising findings, expert perspectives, good practices and recommendations) – Month 5
- **Final Technical Brief / Policy Paper** (Finalised document incorporating UNFPA feedback, peer reviewer comments and consultation inputs) – Month 6

6. Required expertise and qualifications

Proposals may be submitted by think tanks, consulting agencies, public policy institutions, NGOs/academic institutions engaged in high level policy advocacy, or a consortia. The study team shall collectively demonstrate the following qualifications and competencies:

6.1 Team Leader / Principal Researcher

- Advanced degree (doctoral or masters) in gender studies, development studies, social sciences, public policy or a related discipline.
- A minimum of ten years of demonstrated experience in gender-focused research in India, with a strong track record on child marriage, adolescent rights or related issues.



- Demonstrated expertise in analyzing megatrends and demographic shifts (climate change, migration, urbanization, etc.).
- Proven experience in designing and leading complex mixed-methods research and in stakeholder consultation processes.

6.2 Research Team

- Researchers with expertise in qualitative and participatory methods, including experience conducting sensitive research with adolescents and marginalised communities.
- Specialists in relevant thematic areas including climate and disaster risk, migration and urbanization, digital safety and social protection.
- Regional experts with knowledge of and presence in targeted high-prevalence states.
- Language competency in Hindi and relevant regional languages for field research.

6.3 Institutional Requirements

- Demonstrated organisational capacity to manage a national-scope research study including field operations.
- Experience of working with UN agencies, government bodies and civil society in India.
- Compliance with ethical standards for research involving minors and survivors.
- Financial management systems adequate to the scale of the assignment

- A bidder must be a legally-constituted company that can provide the requested services and have legal capacity to enter into a contract with UNFPA to deliver in the country, or through an authorized representative.
- A bidder must not have a conflict of interest regarding the solicitation process or with the TORs / Technical Specifications. Bidders found to have a conflict of interest shall be disqualified.

Both parts of the quotation must be signed by the bidding company’s relevant authority and submitted in PDF format.

VI. Overview of Evaluation Process

The evaluation will be carried out in a two-step process by an ad-hoc evaluation panel. Technical proposals will be evaluated and scored first, prior to the evaluation and scoring of price quotations

Technical Evaluation

Technical proposals will be evaluated based on their responsiveness to the service requirements /TORs listed in Section II and in accordance with the evaluation criteria below.

Financial Evaluation

Price quotes will be evaluated only for bidders whose technical proposals achieve a minimum score of **70** points in the technical evaluation.

Price quotes will be evaluated based on their responsiveness to the price quote form. The maximum number of points for the price quote is 100, which will be allocated to the lowest total price provided in the quotation. All other price quotes will receive points in inverse proportion according to the following formula:

$$\text{Financial score} = \frac{\text{Lowest quote (\$)}}{\text{Quote being scored (\$)}} \times 100 \text{ (Maximum score)}$$

Total score

The total score for each proposal will be the weighted sum of the technical score and the financial score. The maximum total score is 100 points.

$$\text{Total score} = \text{[70\%] Technical score} + \text{[30\%] Financial score}$$

VII. Award Criteria

In case of a satisfactory result from the evaluation process, UNFPA intends to award a Professional Service Contract on a fixed-cost basis to the Bidder(s) that obtain the highest total score.

VIII. Right to Vary Requirements at Time of Award

UNFPA reserves the right at the time of award of contract to increase or decrease by up to 20% the volume of services specified in this RFQ without any change in unit prices or other terms and conditions.

IX. Payment Terms

UNFPA payment terms are net 30 days upon receipt of invoice and delivery/acceptance of the milestone deliverables linked to payment as specified in the contract.
